

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


Spiritual Lessons From a Flat Tire

"If I have told you earthly things, and ye believe not..."

I had told my daughter that the tires on her car were low, that she needed to air them up, or else bad things could happen. Not fully understanding what "bad things" might mean, she put it off. She'd always gotten where she wanted to go, so why worry?

A few days later, I'm very busy with work when I get a phone call from her. She'd had a blowout on the highway; catastrophic tire failure. She was OK, but stranded on the roadside, not knowing where to look for her spare tire, jack and lug wrench. She'd only recently acquired that car, and hadn't taken the time to familiarize herself with such things, so I told her over the phone where to look for the spare, and said that I'd be right over to help.

So I dropped what I was



doing and went to help her. She'd found the spare tire, but not the jack, so I helped her find it. It was an old car, with an old jack that was dried out. The threads stuck, and she'd never have been able to operate it, but I got the car jacked up and removed the lug nuts. Now the old steel rim was rusted onto the hub and wouldn't budge even when I repeatedly kicked it as hard as I could with the heels of my work boots.

I had to fetch my longer, heavier tire iron from my pickup and beat on the old rim as hard as I could before it finally came loose. Even if she'd found all her tools, even if they'd all been in good working order, she'd never have been able to change that tire. She'd never heard of a wheel rusting onto



So, both Union and Confederate armies alike would order the posting of sentries whenever they were in a state of encampment. As the lives of their fellow soldiers depended upon them sounding the alarm, a soldier found guilty of sleeping while on sentry duty was usually sentenced to death by firing squad.

During the war, the families of Union soldiers convicted and condemned for sleeping on duty, would appeal to President Abraham Lincoln for pardon or leniency. President Jefferson Davis, President of the Confederate States of America once said that "The worst use of a soldier is to shoot him", and both men often commuted the sentences of condemned soldiers.

President Lincoln once granted an audience to the mother of one such soldier so condemned. As Lincoln listened to the young man's mother passionately plead for the life of her son, he asked, "Madam, why do you believe that your son deserves mercy?", to which she replied, "Mr. President, if he deserved it, it would not be mercy".

Lentil Haystacks

Any legume (peas, lentils or beans) plus any grain (corn or rice, wheat, etc.) provides a <u>complete</u> protein. This is one of the secrets of living and growing healthy on a mainly plant-based diet.

Haystacks are a quick and delicious way to enjoy the benefits of lentils. Corn chips or tortilla chips are typically used as a base. Next, layer these salsaseasoned lentils (or beans or chili). Then finish building your haystack with shredded lettuce and toppings of your choice, such as chopped tomatoes, onions, peppers, olives, corn, rice, jalapenos, quacamole, sour cream and salsa.

2 cups lentils 4 cups water 1-1/2 tsp salt 1 to 1-1/2 cup medium or mild picante sauce

Directions: Sort out field debris and thoroughly rinse lentils. Bring lentils, salt and water to a boil and then simmer for 20-30 minutes over low heat. Stir occasionally, adding more water when needed. When lentils are soft enough to crush with a spoon, stir in salsa and add more salt if needed.

Yield: 5 x 1 cup servings
